MEETINGS

3.1 *Thursday, August 23, 2013*

The Chairman and Deputy Chairman met with Mrs. Harriette Reid, Canteen Concessionaire, to outline the expectations of the school and the requirements of the canteen contract.

3.2 Friday, October 4, 2013

The Hon. Ronald Jones, Minister of Education, along with the Permanent Secretary and other senior personnel of the Ministry of Education met with Chairmen and Principals of all Public Secondary Schools to discuss the Public Service Act, the Education Act, Governance, the responsibility and limitations of the Principal and Chairman, the role of the Secretary/Treasurer, preparation of Quarterly Performance Reports and Annual Activities Report and the Recruitment Process.

- 3.3 The Acting Deputy Principal attended a Workshop on the School's Positive Behaviour Programme, a policy initiative of the Ministry of Education. The aim of the programme was to recognize, reward and reinforce positive behaviour in schools.
- 3.4 The Chairman and Deputy Chairman met with Ms. Tammi Pilgrim, President of the Old Harrisonian Society and Treasurer, Lt. Col. Owen Springer. The OHS had identified specific projects which it planned to spearhead. The principle event was Project 3000, an initiative to raise in excess of one million dollars annually among Harrisonians, friends, and well-wishers to fund activities such as the arts, sports, student welfare and rehabilitation of the physical plant. A mentorship programme was also to be introduced.

3.5 Thursday, January 2, 2014

The Chairman, Acting Principal and the Secretary/Treasurer met with the Permanent Secretary, Acting Chief Education Officer, Mrs. Karen Best, to discuss the financial challenges facing the school.

3.6 <u>Monday, January 20, 2014</u>

A subset of the Board met with the teaching staff on Monday, January 20, 2014 where the Board outlined its plans over the short, medium and long term. There was discussion about the school's financial position, along with an exchange of ideas for the maintenance and upkeep of the school and containing expenditure given the financial constraints. Other matters discussed included a Traffic Management Proposal prepared by Mr. Andrew Hutchinson of Stantec, the current state of the physical plant and the procedure for appointment to vacant established posts.

3.7 Thursday, May 29, 2014

A meeting was held with Mrs. Reid, Canteen Concessionaire, to discuss concerns relating to the quality of service, portion sizes and late payment of concession fees.

3.8 Wednesday, June 18, 2014

The Chair, Deputy Chair and Head of the Finance & Buildings Committee held consecutive meetings with the ancillary staff and the PTA Executive The discussions focused on the needs of the school, the impact of the economic recession on the provision of goods and services, adopting a new approach to business, pursing new financing opportunities, building new partnerships among stakeholders and improving employee engagement.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

13.1 INTRODUCTION

Harrison College has been positioning itself to prepare students to meet the challenges to compete globally. It is with a sense of satisfaction that we as educator reflect on our efforts while celebrating the achievements of our students.

It was a year of mixed fortunes for Harrison College for although our students did ver well in examinations, sports and extra-curricular activities, these achievements were realized through some adversity. The first such occurrence was the sudden death of Mrs. Heather Archer, former Head of Business Studies Department. At a moment's notice, Mrs. Michelle Gibbons was requested to fill the breach. She ensured that the Department continued on a path designed to achieve its set goals.

The year under review was led by Mr. Joseph Maynard, Acting Principal and Mrs. Sonia Nelson, Acting Deputy Principal. Under their leadership, the students and staff rallied to produce another successful year.

13.2 PROFESSIONAL TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

On Teachers' Professional Day, teachers took part in a seminar led by Dr. Leona Emtage of the Caribbean Examinations Council which dealt with the topic 'Principles of Assessment' A follow-up session on the same topic was held during the term to ensure that teaches were equipped to assess students in order to provide them with meaningful feedback to improve the teaching and learning at the school. It is clear that more professional development sessions must be held outside of the official Teachers' Professional Day, to ensure that our teachers are on the cutting edge with pedagogy and sound educational practices if we are to take our students confidently onto the world stage to compete.

During the 2013-14 academic year our teachers participated in conferences, workshops and training courses held by the Ministry of Education, Science, Technology & Innovation in addition to those put on by other organizations. Several staff members served the Caribbean Examinations Council in the capacity of panel member, assistant chief examiner, and examiner and assistant examiner. The teachers had the opportunity to interact with their colleagues across the region. Not only will this result in our students benefitting from best

practices but it can only redound to the benefit of teaching and learning across the region. This kind of interaction is welcomed and hopefully will translate into greater collaboration among Barbadian schools. In these difficult economic times, with minimal resources at our disposal, now is the time to tap into the wealth of knowledge residing within our teachers and to pool our resources.

13.3 EXAMINATION RESULTS

PROMOTION EXAMS:

The majority of students performed quite well in Promotion examinations but there is a concern over the few students who were not promoted. Students not meeting the required standard were interviewed at the end of last term and again in the middle of this term. Their progress is being monitored. Heads of Departments were tasked with requiring their teachers to reconsider and assess methodologies used with a view to varying such. Students though, have been advised that they must also take responsibility for their own learning. It is expected that this double pronged approach should see an overall improvement in performance in the junior school.

EXTERNAL EXAMS:

CXC CSEC

In the CXC CSEC results, of the (18) eighteen subjects examined, (8) eight subjects recorded 100% passes including 174 students in English A, 120 in Mathematics and 51 in Religious Education. Also in this category of 100 % passes was Additional Mathematics taken for the first time with CXC as the examining body. (7) Seven subjects recorded 90% or more passes including 134 students in English B, 107 in Chemistry; 86 in Biology; 64 in French; 62 in Geography and 117 in Physics. Two subjects recorded 80% passes or more and the other recorded over 70% passes. This resulted in a 95.6 % pass rate overall with 553 grade ones; 433 grade twos and 226 grade threes.

CAPE UNIT I

In the CAPE Unit 1 examinations, it must be noted that of the nineteen subjects taken, (15) fifteen subjects recorded 100% passes, including 51students in Biology, 127 in Communication Studies and 53 in Physics. (3) Three subjects recorded 90% passes or more including 125students in Caribbean Studies and 59 in Chemistry, while (1) one subject recorded more than 70% passes. This resulted in a pass rate of 96.2% with 209 grade ones, 178 grade twos and 140 grade threes.

CAPE UNIT II

In CAPE Unit 2 examinations, special note must be made that of the seventeen subjects taken, (11) eleven subjects recorded 100% passes including, 45 students in Biology, 50 in Chemistry, 19 in Sociology and 23 in Environmental Science. (3) Three subjects recorded passes of 90% or more including 43 passes in Physics, 24 in Literatures in English and 19 in Economics, while the other three recorded 80% passes or more. The overall pass rate was 96.3% with 79 grade ones, 97 grade twos and 79 grade threes.

CXC CSEC REGIONAL MERIT LIST

Two of our students made it onto the Regional Merit List for CXC CSEC where the top ten students across the region are singled out for special recognition:

It was a mixed year for sports at Harrison College. The school started exceptionally well with both the boys' and girls' teams placing first in the Inter-school Swimming Championships. The latter placing has seriously engaged the attention of the school's Physical Education Department. A sports committee has been established, made up of staff, parents and old Harrisonians who have been putting plans in place to improve sports generally in the coming year. The girls also won the Inter-school Football Championships, while the boys won the Under 19 Secondary Schools' Basketball League and Knock-Out titles with the Under 16 boys placing second. We look forward to improved performances in the coming year.

Barbados placed 20th the highest ranking in the competition thus far. The students and their Faculty Advisor must be commended for their performances.

Football

The girls won the Inter-School Secondary Football Championship. Though the
boys did not fare as well it is interesting to note that many of our boys are
gaining football scholarships to United States Colleges. Preparation for this
involves the boys participating in the Copa Americana Tournament with A.C.
Milan and stints with the Digicel Kick Start Academy among others.

Basketball

 The U19 Boys won the Secondary School Basketball League and Knock out titles while the U16 boys finished second.

Track and Field

• The girls placed second in the Inter-school Track and Field Championships but the boys did not fare as well as they placed 8th. There is much work to be done in this area if the school is to return to its place as a powerhouse in boys' athletics in the near future.

Netball

 Two students, Keyla Harewood and Jamie Drayton, represented Barbados in the Caribbean netball association's Jean Pierre Youth (Under 16) Netball Tournament held in Antigua.

Chess

Harrison College won the United Insurance Secondary School Girls' Chess title
with Gabriela Cumberbatch as the champion. She has represented Barbados
winning such tournaments as the CARIFTA Chess championships held in
Martinique. First Former Kyle Sandiford represented Barbados in the Under 12
category in the CARIFTA Chess Tournament. He is one to watch for the
future.

Rugby

 The combined first form Rugby team won the competition among secondary schools.

Hockey

The Under 13 Hockey team came second in the indoor tournament.

Carifta Track and Field

• Three students, Asha Cave, Hayley Matthews and Mario Burke represented Barbados at the CARIFTA Games held in Fort de France, Martinique.

Swimming

- Harrison College did a great job to win the boys and the girls swimming titles
 at the Inter-school swimming championships at the Aquatic Centre in Wildey.
 Many of the swimmers went on to represent Barbados at the CARIFTA Games
 and other regional and international meets.
- Many of our young female swimmers at Harrison College are receiving scholarships to United States high schools to swim. Many of them realise that if they want to pursue their dream to make it to the Olympics and the World championships, they need to take greater steps which provide them with more opportunities and so their parents are taking the necessary steps for them to get there.

The school is in discussion with the Central Bank of Barbados for the proposed refurbishment and upgrade of the sports facilities including outdoor lighting. This joint venture would extend access to the school's facilities to the past and present staff of the bank outside of school hours.
