CHANGES IN MEMBERSHIP

On 31 October 2020, the court bade farewell to its 13th Chief Justice, Sir Marston Gibson, K.A after 11 years of distinguished service. Chief Justice Gibson served for 22 years in the New York State Court system before he returned to Barbados and was appointed to the Office of Chief Justice of Barbados on 1 September 2011. Sir Marston was the first graduate of the University of the West Indies to attain this post. On 31 August 2020, a farewell function filled with tributes, music and laughter was held in the Court of Appeal to honour him.

Hon. Madam Justice Kaye Goodridge, Justice of Appeal, demitted office on 1 December 2020 after over 40 years of distinguished service to the Public Service. Justice Goodridge served as Crown Counsel, Senior Crown Counsel and Magistrate. She was the first female Deputy Solicitor General and the first female Solicitor General. Justice Goodridge served as Judge of the High Court before being appointed as a Justice of Appeal on 1 November 2012. Her over 40 years of service earned her the respect of the Bench and the Bar. A farewell function was held in August 2020 in the Judges Lounge to honour and thank her for her unwavering dedication of service to the Public Service.

Mr. Justice Jefferson Cumberbatch were appointed as Justices of Appeal on 1 January 2020. On 15 January 2020, the Hon. Madam Justice Shona Griffith was appointed as a Judge of the High Court.

Patterson Cheltenham was appointed to the Office of Chief Justice on 1 November 2020. He was conferred as a Knight of St. Andrew (K.A.) on 30 November 2020.

Mrs. Barbara Cooke-Alleyne, Q.C. was appointed to act as a Judge of the High Court on 7 December 2020.

WORK AND ACTIVITIES

IMPACT JUSTICE

In December 2020, IMPACT Justice generously donated 158 law books to the Supreme Court Law Library. The donated books greatly enhanced the collection of books in the Supreme Court Law Library.

THE JUDICIAL REFORM AND INSTITUTIONAL STRENGTHENING (JURIST) PROJECT

Case Management

Mr. Bruce Preston, a Consultant with Bruce Preston International Justice Consultancy was engaged by the JURIST Project to conduct a number of activities, one of which was to review the case management system utilised by the Registration Department.

Mr. Preston visited Barbados from 12 to 24 January 2020 to conduct his review. During his visit, he met with the Chief Justice, the Criminal Division Judges and the Registrar of the Supreme Court. He observed some of the High Courts while in session. He also conducted site visits at some of the Magistrates' Courts. He sought to identify issues with respect to the movement of cases in the courts from commencement until final disposition. He interviewed members of staff and reviewed the case management system processes. He also met with the Statistician to examine the type of court statistics being collated as well as the process utilised to generate those statistics.

Client Service Standards

From late July until early September, Mr. Preston conducted virtual training sessions with members of staff to produce a Client Services Manual for the Registration Department. The draft manual produced by Mr. Preston was given to each participant to work with during each session. Fifteen (15) persons were trained at each session. A working group was established comprising of the following persons:

A service standards document was drafted by the Working Group. The draft service standards are specific to the practices and processes of the High Court, Magistrates' Court, and the Mediation Department. These service standards are intended to be a living document which can be reviewed and edited as processes and practices evolve and change. The document is incomplete as Mr. Preston was unable to meet with two departments.

Backlog Reduction

At the beginning of July 2020, the JURIST Project and the Judiciary of Barbados signed a Charter document entitled "Backlog Reduction – Barbados". The activity scope of the backlog reduction project is as follows:


- 1. To support the improvement of case processing from filing to disposition in Barbados.
- 2. Reduce the current backlog which existed in the Supreme Court.
- 3. Enhance the use of technology and mediation to reduce delays and build the capacity of court staff in implementing client service, service standards, collection of statistics and report.

COVID-19 Stickers

In August 2020, JURIST supplied the Supreme Court Complex and all the Magistrates' courts with Covid-19 protocol signage.

Presentation of laptops

On 17 August 2020, a handing over ceremony was held in the foyer of the Supreme Court Complex, at which H.E. Ms. Marie-Therese Legault, High Commissioner of Canada to Barbados, formally handed over fifty-four (54) laptops to the Supreme Court. The laptops had been procured by the JURIST Project to enable staff of the Registration Department to

Gender Sensitive Adjudication Workshop

A Gender Sensitive Adjudication Workshop was held at the Lloyd Erskine Sandiford Center on 11 September 2020 for members of the Judiciary and the Magistracy.

PRACTICE DIRECTIONS

The following Practice Directions were issued in the year under review:

- Practice Direction No. 1 of 2020 Designation of Persons as Terrorists and/or Terrorist Entities for Freezing Orders Delisting and Counter Proliferation Orders under Sections 8, 9 and 10B of the Anti-Terrorism (Amendment) Act, 2019-34. This Practice Direction came into effect on 14 January 2020.
- Practice Direction No. 2 of 2020 Fixed Dates for Criminal Cases. The objective of this Practice Direction is to reduce the delay, increase the speed of access to justice for complainants, defendants and other users of the Criminal Justice System, eliminate the backlog, establish a degree of certainty and predictability for listings, foster and restore the public confidence in the system, provide for good management in the delivery of justice and to eventually lead to a general attainment of trials within three months of indictment or first arraignment or six months latest. This Practice Direction came into effect on 7 February 2020.

- *Practice Direction No. 3 of 2020* Guidelines for Electronic or other Remote Hearings.
- <u>Practice Direction No. 4 of 2020</u> Status Hearings on Backlog Cases. The purpose of this Practice Direction is to complete Status Hearings in a timely manner.
- <u>Practice Direction No. 5 of 2020</u> Special Measures. The purpose of this Practice Direction is to establish the procedure for special measures and those giving evidence via the live link in criminal proceedings whether within or outside of Barbados.

CONTINUING EDUCATION AND TRAINING

- In January 2020, the Hon. Mr. Justice Randall Worrell, Judge of the High Court, attended a two-day *Judge Alone Trials Seminar* hosted by the British High Commission, and the Judicial Education Institute of Trinidad and Tobago at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, in Trinidad, 13-14 January 2020.
- In February 2020, the Hon. Madam Justice Margaret Reifer, Justice of Appeal and the Hon. Madam Justice Sonia Richards, Judge of the High Court attended a CMJA Judicial Case Management & Ethics Workshop at the Civil Service College in the United Kingdom, 10-13 February 2023.
- The Hon. Mr. Justice Randall Worrell virtually attended a *Technical Working Group on Financial Crimes* facilitated by CARICOM Implementation Agency for Crime and Security (IMPACS) on 16, 23 and 28 September, 2020.
