

Preface

The **2021 Population & Housing Census (PHC)** in Barbados was conducted by the Barbados Statistical Service in an environment that was not normal. Census Day was August 1st 2021, as decided by Cabinet. Enumeration of the resident population living in private households in Barbados started from the second week of August 2021 and ended on September 30th 2022. New technology (Computer Assisted Personal Interviewing) was used for the first time, involving the use of tablets.

Challenges encountered over the period included impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic in Barbados, high attrition rates among the temporary census workers, deficiencies in IT equipment and services, and inclement weather at times. Extending the duration of enumeration, originally scheduled for under 3 months, was a solution employed to overcome these challenges in an effort to enumerate the whole island. Paper questionnaires were used in the field to collect data whenever the IT services on the tablets failed. When census enumeration officially ended in the field at the end of September 2022, a few areas were not visited. Alternative methods were pursued to fill this gap and to estimate the total resident population, using available administrative records.

This Census Report presents the estimated resident population as at August 1st 2021 and the tabulated population enumerated, from all areas actually visited over the past 13 months of enumeration. The extended enumeration period was actually interrupted by two short breaks:

- during December 2021 to January 2022 when an unexpected general election was held on January 18th 2022; and
- 2) during July 10th 2022 to August 17th 2022, when there was a security concern (which threaten the safety of Census workers), and it was referred to the Police for resolution.

Our gratitude is expressed to international, regional and local organizations that gave support to the Statistical Department with the conduct of the Census. Advice and guidance were obtained from the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), CARICOM's Regional Census Coordination Committee (RCCC), and Statistics Canada (under the Project for the Regional Advancement of Statistics in the Caribbean). An External Census Advisory Committee, consisting of local organizations from various

sectors, assisted with the review of questions that were included in the Census questionnaire. We are grateful to all the members of this group who participated in the review and offered their suggestions.

We express our appreciation to the temporary Census workers, who participated in this Census under extremely difficult conditions at times. We also express our appreciation to the staff of the Census Office and especially those members of the Department, who worked with the Census Internal Planning Committee and its various sub-committees. We are also grateful to all those organizations that contributed information towards the development of the Census questionnaire.

In the future, we would recommend that the length of the Census questionnaire should be considerably shortened. This recommendation would greatly reduce the time taken to administer the Census instrument by personal interviewing, and increase the likelihood of completing the total enumeration of all private households in the island within a short time interval.

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1.0 Introduction

A Population and Housing Census (PHC) is one of the biggest and toughest undertakings that any Statistical Office will undertake and the 2021 PHC was without exception. Enumeration of the resident population, in the households where they lived, started the second week of August 2021 and was conducted by the Barbados Statistical Service (BSS). Computer Assisted Personal Interviewing (CAPI) was employed with the use of tablets. This marks a significant shift in the mode of Census enumeration and a step in the right direction.

For Barbados, the specified time for Census Day is traditionally May 1st, in the year that ends with '0'. Hence May 1, 1980, May 1, 1990, etc. This Census was an anomaly as Census Day was August 1, 2021, and enumeration lasted for longer than four (4) months in the field. This was due mainly to the postponement of PHC resulting from complications caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, and the effects of a high attrition rate of enumeration.

1.1. What is a Population and Housing Census (PHC)

A Population Census¹ is defined as the total process of planning, collecting, compiling, evaluating, disseminating and analysing demographic, economic and social data at the smallest geographic level pertaining, at a specified time, to all persons in a country or a well-delimited part of a country. The specified time referenced is the Census Day.

Similarly, a Housing Census is the total process of planning, collecting, compiling, evaluating, disseminating and analysing statistical data relating to the number and conditions of housing units and facilities available to the household at a specified time, to all living quarters and occupants thereof in a country.

The primary purpose of a Population and Housing Census is to count the entire population and housing stock of a country. In addition to the count of the population and the housing stock, data is collected on population characteristics (e.g. its size, age, sex, social and economic composition), which is central to the monitoring of international concerns such as the 2030 global agenda for countries.

The PHC also facilitates the production of population projections and the documentation of trends in fertility, mortality, migration, life expectancy and related population dynamics. It also provides benchmark data to aid the selection of sample frames for the conduct of future surveys on specific phenomena. Without consistent census taking data gaps will be inevitable. Surveys that rely on Census data will have out dated sample frames and national and sectoral planning decisions will be based on outdated and unreliable statistics. At the international level, comparability of development indicators with other countries would be compromised if the Population and Housing Census is not conducted.

1.2. Census Design - Type of Census: De jure vs. De facto

A "**De facto**" Census refers to the situation where everyone present on the island on Census night is counted. Both visitors and persons usually living in the country are included in this count.

Traditionally in Barbados, a "**De jure**" Census is conducted. This practice has continued for the 2021 Census. It is a count of all people where they usually live, or at their usual place of residence (once they were living on the island for six (6) months or more, they are considered to be a resident). This means that information was not only collected on residents present in Barbados on Census day, but also on persons usually resident in Barbados, who were abroad and were expected to return to Barbados within six months of their departure. This concept of a resident also included:

- a) Barbadian diplomats working in missions in foreign countries;
- b) Foreign students who have been studying or were expected to be studying in Barbados for periods in excess of six (6) months.

1.3. Impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on Preparation and Implementation of the PHC

With the shutdown of the island in late March 2020 due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, and once again in January 2021, a Cabinet decision led to the postponement of Census Day to **August 1st**, **2021**. The relevant legislation was instituted prior to Census Day – i.e., the Census Order 2021, and the Census (Population and Housing) Regulations 2021. This legislation was further extended in 2022. The final revised Census Order 2022 stated that enumeration would end on September 30, 2022.

Due to the pandemic and the need to follow health and safety protocols for all Census Workers, social distancing mandates restricted the number of persons who could be accommodated at venues for Census training. This limitation restricted the number of available venues suitable for Census training and led to a reduction in the number of persons who could be trained at any single period. Consequently, rather than training 609 Census Enumerators for the 2021 Census, it was determined that the number of workers be reduced by half and start the enumeration with 305 individuals. Initially, each worker was assigned two (2) EDs to be completed. In addition, face masks and hand sanitizers had to be procured for all Census Workers to be distributed as part of their work packages.

The Census Office did suffer consistently throughout the enumeration with staff at all levels being infected by COVID-19. This meant that once individuals were infected, the necessary testing and quarantine period was operationalised. The result of which meant that teams were without either enumerators or supervisors at various points in time

1.4. Legal basis for the PHC – Census Order and Regulations

The Statistics Act Cap. 192 of the Laws of Barbados provides the legal authority for the conduct of any Census. It specifies that the Minister responsible for Statistics may by order direct that a Census be taken. Consequently, a Census Order and Census Regulations were gazetted. The Census Order prescribes the following:

- (a) Census Day,
- (b) the dates between which a Census is to be undertaken, and
- (c) the information to be obtained in such a Census.

The Census Regulations provide the detailed information to be obtained in the Census; such as the forms to be used, how the Census was to be conducted, the appointment of officers and their functions.

1.5. The Census Office and Committees

A Census Office was established to coordinate the conduct of the 2021 Population and Housing Census, similar to a project unit. It initially consisted of the following temporary officers:

Structure of the Census Office:

- 1 Census Coordinator in place from November 2nd, 2020;
- 1 Census Assistant Accountant in place, March 18th, 2021;
- 1 Census Statistician in place, May 18th, 2021;
- 1 Census Mapping Officer in place, June 16th, 2021;
- 1 Census Accounts Clerk in place, June 17th 2021;
- 10 Coders only 7 individuals were appointed to the BSS, from November 8th, 2021;
- **2 Coding Supervisors** from November 8th, 2021.

The life of the Census Office ended on March 31st, 2023.

During the Census Office's existence, the initial Census Assistant Accountant was reassigned to another Ministry, and a replacement was obtained - in March 2022. On July 29th, 2022 one of the Coding Supervisors was terminated and was not replaced. At the end of January 2023 the Census Statistician resigned; and a replacement was recruited on contract for 2 months, ending March 31st, 2023.

Temporary Contract Census workers

- **Census IT Officer** contracted from July 15th, 2021, for 6 months initially; His contract was extended to March 3rd, 2023.
- **Assistant Census IT Officer** contracted from February 9th, 2022 for 2 months initially; His contract was extended to March 3rd, 2023.
- **15 UWI Student Interns** were engaged from around August 2021; to assist with the IT work assignments, which were sent to the Enumerators' tablets, and other Census related tasks.
- For Census Enumeration (from August 2021):
 - a) **Census Enumerators** 305 individuals were initially engaged, with 60 reserves.
 - b) **Census Supervisors** 61 individuals, initially.
 - c) **Senior Census Supervisors** 15 persons (mainly BSS field staff).
 - d) **Trainers** 25 persons (including 16 BSS staff).

e) **Census Supervisors/Enumerators** – 30 posts were created, from October 2021.

Committees

Planning of the Census was started from early 2017, with the establishment of the *Census Internal Planning Committee* (CIPC) and its various sub-committees. The Census Internal Planning Committee guided overall PHC planning while the sub-committees role was to execute on the plans of the CIPC. These groups were composed of members of staff at all levels, some with previous census experience. They planned and organized the various components of the Census activities; from its financing, and publicity, preparation of manuals, training and recruitment, field operations, processing, analysis and dissemination of data

A *Census External Advisory Committee* (CEAC) was also formed, to provide advice on the Census questionnaire that was developed; with some guidance from the Regional Census Coordination Committee's (RCCC) recommended questionnaire. This CEAC group was composed of a cross section of institutions, some of which proposed questions for inclusion in the Census questionnaire. The CIPC determined the final set of questions included in this Census instrument – reference Appendix IV. A pre-test of the questionnaire was conducted by BSS field staff during February 2020, using existing office tablets.

1.6 Procurement of Census Tablets

Computer Assisted Personal Interviewing (CAPI) was the main mode of data capture for the Census, using tablets. During the first quarter of 2020, discussions were held between the Barbados Statistical Service (via the Ministry of Economic Affairs), with the Government of Kenya to procure tablets for data capture through a Technical Cooperation Agreement (TCA). The COVID-19 pandemic presented the challenge where logistics to conduct meetings proved difficult. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs was requested in September 2020 to officially make contact with the Government of Kenya (as the department should not make direct contact with another foreign Country). This initiative failed.

Consequently, prior to March 2021, a local supplier was used to procure four hundred (400) Census tablets and cases; which were used for data capture in the field. The devices were equipped with Sim cards, to allow data to be transmitted remotely to the Census server in the BSS. However, the time needed to test the tablets through the use of a Census Pilot was not adequate.

The consequence of this was that the full Census operation was not fully vetted to identify all software errors.

2.0 Methodology

The PHC was conducted by in-person interviewing of individuals in their households or place of residence. For data capture, interviewers initially utilized tablets, (Computer Assisted Personal Interviewing, CAPI) with a remote link to the Census server of the BSS.

However, as census progressed, a multi-mode approach was introduced during the Census enumeration as a measure to counteract against frequent tablet failures that were occurring. Paper and Pencil Interviewing (PAPI) through the use of printed questionnaires was utilized.

Temporary Census Workers, from constituencies across the country, were assigned to the department to conduct the enumeration. They were trained initially to conduct the Household Listing, and subsequently, the Population and Housing Census (PHC) enumeration.

After the information was collected via the tablet, the data was checked for errors and sent to Census Coders to code the necessary fields in the International Standard Industrial Classification of All Economic (ISIC) Rev. 4, Barbados Standard Occupational Classification (BARSOC), Country (ISO 3166-1) and Community Codes.

2.1 How was the PHC conducted?

Census enumeration was conducted in private households where people live. To achieve this successfully, without any duplications, the island was demarcated into 609 Enumeration Districts (EDs), each with its boundary descriptions and numerical sequencing. The boundaries were digitized into a Geographical Information System (GIS) and e-maps were created for each ED. The appropriate e-map was displayed on the tablet when assigned to each Census Enumerator. A Visitation Record was also maintained, to keep track of the households and buildings visited.

The Census was undertaken using a mixed-mode approach to data collection. Computer-Assisted Personal Interviewing (CAPI) was mainly used, with tablets. When this technology failed in the field, paper questionnaires were used to record the information, which was subsequently entered on tablets or computers. Computer-Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) was also employed in the latter

stages of enumeration, as a means to ensure that all available methods of collecting data was utilised, given the challenges.

The software used for CAPI was Surveys Solution (developed by the World Bank). The Census questionnaire (which was developed by late 2018), was programmed into CAPI by two of the IT Officers in the BSS, using this software in 2019. Amendments were made in 2021 to the digital questionnaire in response to a glitch that was occurring on the tablets. This glitch was contributing to tablets crashing in the field with enumerators.

2.2 Data Cleaning and Quality Control

Data transmitted to the Census server by Census Enumerators were directed to their respective Census Supervisors for checking electronically. Any work with errors was rejected to the Census Enumerator for correction. Accepted work was forwarded to Senior Supervisors for final review and approval. Approved work was then sent to the Coders, for the specific fields to be actioned – such as numeric fields for country, occupation and industry.

With the addition PAPI, information on paper questionnaires was entered by Census interns and verified by Census Supervisors electronically. The quality control process continued where errors were rejected to enumerators for correction and accepted work forwarded to Senior Supervisors for final review and approval.

Additional quality control was performed on the final dataset using a SPSS syntax, which corrected errors and edited the data for consistency.

2.3 Final Census Estimates

The total resident population estimates were derived from the corresponding 2010 Census estimates, adjusted by subsequent births and deaths which occurred each year to 1st August 2021, with an adjustment for net migration over the intervening period. This method was utilised to counteract the large undercount referenced in Section 5.2.

Collected data were also compiled on the institutionalized population and the homeless population, along with the tabulated Census population, as at 1st August 2021, to derive an estimate of the undercount in this Census.

The total resident population estimates were disaggregated by age-groups, based on ratios derived from the tabulated Census results. The disaggregation by parish was based on ratios derived from an analysis of administrative data utilised by the department.

These population estimates are presented in Tables A to D below (in section 5.2).

3.0 The Enumeration process: Recruitment of Census Workers

The Training and Recruitment subcommittee developed a recruitment schedule which spanned a period of three (3) months to recruit and vet in excess of six-hundred and nine (609) suitable candidates, who may have wished to apply for the available Census posts. An online application form, housed on BSS' website, was created by BSS IT officers. However, this recruitment process was aborted, given a directive that the department would be supplied with a list of unemployed persons, from which Census personnel should be chosen.

The attrition rate among this group of workers was very high during the first quarter of enumeration. The main reasons for this high attrition rate was the expectation by enumerators that payments would have been made every two weeks, as stated in their respective contracts and many persons, even though they were trained, were not the best fit for field enumeration.

The department was given permission to recruit enumerators after consistent attrition led to the significant portions of the island not being manned by enumerators. While the department had an unused online application already in place as a recruitment tool, the time and experienced staff needed to properly interview interested applicants who would then be invited to training was not possible, as staff was already immersed in the rigours of Census enumeration

As a result, all persons who applied online were invited to training except for those who were under aged or those who worked in regulatory agencies or departments of government. Ultimately, the slow pace of Census payments was the most significant reason attrition was high.

Supervisors and Senior Supervisors for the Census were chosen initially from members of staff of the BSS. Some of the early recruits provided to the department who had proved their ability during the Household Listing were chosen as Supervisors. Over the course of the PHC a small number of supervisors were unable to continue and these were replaced with enumerators who had demonstrated a high level of competence in understanding the job and former members of staff.

The duties of Supervisors were varied and is described in the following:

- To personally observe the initial interview of each enumerator assigned to them during the first week of enumeration and thereafter, to visit each enumerator in the field at least once a week;
- To deal with all problems facing enumerator in the field, for example, call backs, refusals, non -contacts etc.;
- To check, verify and approve all data entered by their enumerators in the Census server.

Senior Supervisor roles included that of Supervisors, but had the additional responsibility of managing a section of the island and ensuring that the entire area has been enumerated. Senior Supervisors were allocated four to five supervisors, depending on the size of the area, and each supervisor on average was tasked with supervising five to six enumerators.

Tertiary level students in UWI's and BCC's "give back" programme, were also recruited during 2021. After the period of the "Give back hours" was completed, fifteen (15) students who displayed the requisite skills and abilities transitioned into student interns. During the second quarter of 2022, most student interns were promoted to a Supervisory capacity where they would approve questionnaires that enumerators had entered in their tablets. By the end of the work assignment, they worked in various capacities within the Census office as described in the following:

- Delimiting blocks with Building Identifications on digital maps, using the "left-hand rule"
- Assisting Census Supervisors with any office duties related to field enumeration
- Assisting enumerators with tablet faults encountered
- Receiving and clearing Census kits returned
- Entering information recorded on Visitation Records
- Approving Questionnaires in Surveys Solutions

Assisting with Census Training

3.1 The Household Listing Exercise

Prior to Census Enumeration an attempt at the Household Listing was conducted. The purpose of which was to obtain complete and up-to-date addresses and contact information of all households in Barbados and in so doing, a record of the total number of persons in each household. This was in an effort to produce an initial estimate of the total population to be enumerated for the Population and Housing Census.

This initial estimate was to be used primarily as a check, to ensure enumeration in each household was accounted for during the PHC enumeration.

The Household Listing began on May 31st, 2022. Shortly after, it was reported that the tablets which were being used by Listing staff were freezing, running hot and blanking out, while in the process of conducting their duties. Subsequently, from June 11th to June 29th the household listing was halted to rectify the problems that were occurring with the devices. After the listing exercise had recommenced it was halted, once again, this time due to the Census Legislation not being gazetted.

After this, the Household Listing exercise was completely abandoned. However, because the Listing information was important to Census Enumeration operations, a revised strategy of incorporating the Household Listing into Census Enumeration was undertaken.

Household Listing Training

The household listing is the process of creating a list of all household along with pertinent identifiers that clearly recognises where households are located, and to have an initial quick count of the population. The information is foundational to support the start of the Census enumeration. Training of persons was conducted using a face to face approach even though the height of the pandemic was ongoing. This was determined to be most effective given the range and complexity of subject matter taught to trainees. Class exercises, role play and tests and a practical exercise in the field were used to determine the best candidates.

The dates for the Household Listing training were as follows:

Training of Trainers – May 6th, 2021

Training of Supervisors – May 7th – May 10th, 2021

Training of Listers – May 12th – June 2nd, 2021

3.2 Census Training

Training for the Population and Housing Census Enumeration followed a similar format as training done for the Household Listing. From the experience of household listing it was determined that face to face training would be the better choice of training persons for the Census, and similar assessments were used. Dates for training were as follows:

Training of Trainers and Seniors – July 5th – July 9th, 2021

Training of Supervisors – July 13th – July 16th, 2021

Enumerator Training – July 19th – July 23rd, 2021

After the Enumerator training was conducted the best candidates were selected and the department had a pool of reserves to be used in the event that an enumerator could not continue with the program. However, by the start of the Population and Housing Enumeration, because of the high drop-out rate experienced, the reserves were quickly utilized; leading to a deficit of persons needed to enumerate the island. As a result of this, additional training sessions were conducted, for new recruits, in an effort to have sufficient persons to enumerate the island. Census personnel and retired members of staff were enlisted and training for these additional persons occurred.

3.3 Deployment of Census Workers

Census enumeration in the field commenced the week of August 11, 2021. Each Enumerator was initially assigned two (2) EDs in which to work during August and September, 2021. With the use of

the tablet, it was anticipated that enumeration would take one month to complete, however the process took longer than expected,

Monitoring of Census enumeration revealed that enumeration was not proceeding as quickly as the department had anticipated. A change of strategy was used where teams of enumerators – as much as possible - were deployed to the more densely populated parishes, from February 2022. The change of strategy yielded better results as compared to when enumerators worked alone. Working together in teams boosted the confidence of enumerators; however, the high attrition rate still proved to be detrimental.

3.4 Institutionalized Population

In addition to those individuals who live in non-institutionalized households, persons who live in private and public institutions, as well as the homeless, are also counted. The counts are then incorporated in the official estimated population count.

Information was collected from the following Institutions:

- a) Children's Homes
- b) Nursing or Old People's Homes
- c) Correctional Facilities
- d) District Hospitals

In this Census round the homeless population was enumerated with the assistance of The Barbados Alliance to End Homelessness.

4.0 Limitations and Difficulties Encountered

Some of the major limitations and difficulties encountered in this Census are recorded below.

4.1 Lack of Pilot Exercise:

The introduction of CAPI was a step in a positive direction. However, no pilot exercise was conducted prior to the actual enumeration. Time was not accorded to the Department to test the tablets used in the field, with all the software that the tablets were required to handle during enumeration. This situation was due to the late acquisition of the tablets from a local source, during the first quarter of the year 2021; after the tablets, which were initially to be obtained from Kenya under a technical cooperation arrangement, never materialized (after the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic in both countries).

4.2 Change in Recruitment process:

Different recruitment processes were introduced in this round of the Census. In previous censuses, persons were interviewed (as with any other job opportunity), thereby allowing those candidates who fit the necessary requirements of the responsibility, to be selected. This time around, unemployed persons from different constituencies across the island were presented to the Department, to conduct the Census enumeration. Many of this initial group of enumerators dropped out of the enumeration, within the first month of the exercise. Replacements were constantly needed. Consequently, the recruitment process was changed, to allow the engagement of persons with previous census experience. This required organizing additional training sessions for all new recruits. Securing the required resources for additional training sessions was challenging at times.

4.3 Abandonment of Household Listing:

The Census enumeration was initially to be preceded by a Listing exercise, from June 2021, to identify and locate all households in the island. Listing the various Enumeration Districts was halted prematurely. Firstly, due to problems encountered with the tablets; secondly, due to the legislation not being in place at the time. Eventually, the Listing and the Census enumeration were combined into one operation, from August 2021.

4.4 Hardware and Software Challenges with Tablets:

Problems were experienced with the tablets in the field. These problems included some of the tablets running hot and freezing during operation; not handling well a large volume of data at any one time, along with the digital ED map. When these issues occurred in the field, Census enumerators were forced to use paper questionnaires to record the information, and subsequently enter it electronically when they were able to do so. In the latter periods of the enumeration, when such data completed on paper forms started to accumulate, their data capture had to be completed in the Census Office by student interns and other staff.

4.5 Labour Force Survey simultaneously in the field with the PHC:

The quarterly Labour Force Survey (LFS) continued to be conducted during the period of the Census enumeration; unlike other censuses, when it was suspended for the duration of the census. The LFS was conducted by the permanent field staff of the BSS; who also, worked in the Census enumeration. The BSS field staff collaborated with the temporary Census workers who were assigned to EDs in the LFS sample. To minimize response burden by householders, the first officer to visit a dwelling unit in these EDs was instructed to inform the householder to expect a visit by the other officer. In most cases, the officers assisted each other in collecting both Census and LFS data, when they were in one of the sample LFS EDs at the same time. However, conducting both exercises simultaneously was very demanding on the BSS field staff, and also on some respondents.

4.6 Payment Challenges:

The Census is normally conducted as a project, where persons are paid at the end of the exercise. In this Census, the Department was asked to institute a system in which Census enumerators could be paid every two weeks. This system was not successful, as the Accounts personnel were not able to process the payments within that time frame - given the volume of Census workers' claims/invoices that needed to be checked and verified each week; first by the Census Supervisors and Senior Supervisors (for data quality and accuracy of work done), then by the Accounts staff. As a result, some enumerators stopped working when they were not paid in the time frame that they expected.

4.7 High Attrition of Enumerators:

By the end of the first 3 months of enumeration the number of temporary Census workers had dropped to almost half the initial amount (e.g. from 305 to 170 enumerators). Consequently, the time period was extended for the Census enumeration, in an effort to cover all Enumeration Districts (EDs) in the island: first, to the end of November 2021; then, from January 2022 to 31 March 2022; and finally, to end on 30 September, 2022.

4.8 The Impact of COVID-19:

The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic limited the Census enumeration. Many Census workers and staff became sick. They had to go through their period of convalescence required, before returning to field work. Some staff contracted the COVID-19 virus twice.

Enumerators were not allowed to enter any dwelling units during the enumeration, due to the COVID-19 protocols in place. All interviews had to be conducted outside the dwelling unit. When any household was in COVID-19 quarantine at the time of the enumerators' visit, access to the residents was not possible. The number of call backs to households were limited. Consequently, some residents may have been missed. In some cases, the total number of occupants in a household may not have been verified, as some individuals were evasive with the Census workers.

4.9 Adverse Weather:

The Census was started during the hurricane season, unlike previous censuses. During periods of adverse weather (e.g. heavy rainfall) enumeration in the field was not possible.

4.10 Security Breach:

An enumeration stoppage occurred during June to July 2022, when Census products (Census polo shirts and ID cards) were being offered for sale by a former Census Lister. This was a serious security issue, as videos were widely circulated publicly. It caused much concern among householders and Census staff. This incident caused Census workers to be out of the field for two months, until the Police Department found the perpetrator and resolved the matter.

5.0 Findings and Results

From the tabulated Census results, it was evident that a few EDs in most parishes were not enumerated, or were not fully enumerated. Consequently, available administrative records were used to supplement the Census results and to derive the total estimated resident population, as at 1st August 2021.

5.1 Data Sources

A variety of data sources were explored, to achieve a fairly accurate estimation of the total resident population in Barbados. These data sources included the following:

- records on births and deaths from the Registration Department, from 2010 to 2021;
- information from the Electoral Department, which was extracted from the new Trident ID card registration process;
- information from land tax sources on the number of residential land plots on island;
- data from the Ministry of Housing on their "Seek and Secure" housing stock assessment project (which was conducted during 2022);
- data from private sources, such as the number of domestic customers of the water and electricity utilities establishments.

5.2 Population Estimates

Estimates for the total resident population in Barbados are presented in the following tables below (Tables A to D).

The decline in the population over time (1950 - 2022) is illustrated in Appendix II – where the number of deaths have overtaken the number of births in the population from the year 2016 and afterwards.

The modal age-groups are illustrated in charts A-C and D, which follow after the tables.

A median age is also derived for the 2021 Census results. It follows after the charts.

Given the many setbacks that occurred in this Census, an under count of around 49% was realized.

The undercount of the Estimated Resident Population by Parish and Sex can be referenced in Appendix III.






Table D illustrates the progression of the modal cohort of persons in the population. In the year 2000 the largest proportion of persons from within the eighteen five-year age groups was found in the 35-39 age group. This represents the modal group, and this cohort of persons can be tracked through each decade. The yellow highlight shows this group of persons as they age each decade, from the year 2000 to 2021.

This group of persons can also be tracked through the use of a population pyramid – as seen in Charts A-C below.

With each subsequent decade the movement of this group - as they age - can be seen. In 1990, the modal group were within the ages of 25-29. Ten years later, this group moved to the 35-39 age-group (with the principle remaining of them being the largest age-group cohort). With the years 2010 and 2021 the progression remains, and is consistent.


Chart D: 2021 Population Pyramid - Age Sex Distribution

Median Age

Further to the use of a population pyramid, another index of a population's age sex structure is the Median Age. The Median Age is often used as tool to determine whether a population is old, young or in the intermediate stage. Populations with a median age of less than twenty years are considered "Young"; those with median ages of between twenty and thirty are considered "Intermediate"; and those with a median age of greater that thirty are considered "Old".

When the median age of a country rises it is said to be aging, and when it falls it considered to be "Younging". The medium age from the 2021 Population and Housing Census results indicate that the median age is now forty-two point five (42.5) compared to thirty-seven point three (37.3) last Census.

Median Age² is calculated as follows, using the results of the 5 year age groups:

6.0 Tabulated Results

The tabulated results of the 2021 Census can be regarded as a large sample of the resident population in Barbados. Selected tables are presented below, which show the national perspective of various characteristics of the Census data compiled. In most cases, disaggregation by area is not included – as most results at that level would be understated, considering the significant size of the undercount.

The table below (1A) presents the response rate by parish for the total buildings enumerated during the Census. The tabulated Census results represent the usable population data that was compiled from the data obtained during the enumeration.

APPENDIX I - Explanatory Notes (Metadata)

Concepts and definitions

Building – A permanent physical structure, which is separate and independent from any other. A building may comprise one or more rooms or other spaces, covered by a roof and enclosed within external walls or dividing walls that extend from the foundations to the roof. It may be used for (intended to be used for) residential, agricultural, commercial, industrial or cultural purposes or for the provision of services. Detached rooms *relating to the main building* are treated as part of that building.

Dwelling Unit – A private dwelling unit (or housing unit) is either a separate building or an independent part of a building or a room or a suite of rooms used or intended to be used for living purposes. The key factors in identifying a dwelling unit are *separateness and independence*. Occupiers of a dwelling unit must have free access to the street by their own separate and independent entrances without having to pass through the living quarters of another household. Note that "free access" includes access through public or communal staircases, passageways, galleries, hallways, grounds etc.

Institution – For the purposes of the Census an institution is defined as living quarters in which the occupants live collectively for disciplinary, health, educational, religious or other reasons. Such institutions include prisons, reform schools, homes for the aged/district hospitals, convents, monasteries, hotels and guest houses (with six (6) or more separate flats/apartments).

Resident – A resident is a person who on Census Day has been living/intends to live in Barbados for a period of six (6) months or more.

Usual Residence – This is defined as the place where a person being enumerated lives and sleeps most of the time.

(a) For persons with more than one home, the usual residence will be the one at which the person spends the greater part of the year. Thus, for an individual who has more than one

- place of residence, because his workplace or school is away from home, the usual residence should be that place in which he/she spends at least four nights of the week.
- (b) Fishermen at sea are considered to have their place of usual residence where they dwell when on shore.
- (c) Barbadians in the farm labour programme were enumerated in their usual households; seamen or crewmembers on vessels plying foreign ports should record as their usual residence the place where they stay when on shore.
- (d) Aircraft pilots are considered to have their usual residence in the households in which they dwell.
- (e) Foreign diplomats are the usual residents of the countries they represent and were not enumerated.

Household – A household consists of *a person or group of persons* living together in a dwelling unit. Where there are several persons living together in a household these persons may comprise a single family, but there are also households where the persons are not members of one family.

Head of Household (Private) – For purposes of investigating family structure from Census information each household was asked to identify a "head". The head of the household is the person, man or woman, whom that household acknowledges to be the head. He or she may or may not be the chief breadwinner.

In the case of a group of unrelated persons sharing a **dwelling unit** on an equal basis, the person recorded as the head was the member of the group whom the others acknowledge as the head.


APPENDIX II - A Decline in the Population

The population of Barbados is Aged and is not refreshing itself at a rate fast enough to replenish itself.

This is as a direct consequence of a sustained decline in the births in the island in conjunction with a new phenomenon where the deaths began a steady increase in 2014, with a crossover of births and deaths occurring in 2016.

Chart E below displays the above; if this scenario continues our population will continue to decline.


